Lieutenant Colonel Keith Benoit

LTC Keith Benoit enlisted in the Army in 1993 as an Indirect Fire Infantryman. After assignments to Fort Benning, GA and Fort Drum, NY serving in various leadership positions up to Mortar Section Sergeant, LTC Benoit received a Green to Gold scholarship in 2000 and attended Worcester State College in Worcester, MA.

Graduating in 2003, LTC Benoit was commissioned as a 2LT in the Aviation branch, attended flight training at Fort Rucker, AL and qualified in the OH-58D Kiowa Warrior. Following flight school, he was assigned to Fort Bragg, NC as a battalion S2, recon platoon leader in the 82nd Airborne Division. and as an aviation planner for a forward deployed special operations task force in the Joint Special Operations Command deploying to Iraq and Afghanistan. He was then assigned to Fort Stewart, GA serving as a Brigade Aviation Officer and ground Cavalry Troop Commander in the 3rd Infantry Division while deployed in support of Operation Iragi Freedom in Mosul, Iraq. Following command, he was assigned to the National Training Center in Fort Irwin, CA where he served as an Observer/ Controller and commanded the flight detachment. After assignment to the Naval War College, LTC Benoit completed an aircraft transition to the AH-64 Apache and was assigned to Joint Base Lewis-McChord in Washington. During his time there he served as a Squadron Operations and Executive officer while deployed to Operation Inherent Resolve in Iraq and Syria and later as the Brigade Operations Officer for the 16th Combat Aviation Brigade. In his most recent assignment, he served as an operations officer in an assigned unit to the Joint Special Operations Command in the National Capital Region and is currently assigned as the commander of the 6th Squadron, 6th Cavalry Regiment at Fort Drum, NY. He is slated to assume the position of Chief of Tactics Division for the Aviation Branch at Fort Novosel following this assignment.

LTC Benoit's awards include the Bronze Star (1 OLC), Defense Meritorious Service Medal, Meritorious Service Medal (2 OLC), Air Medal, Joint Service Commendation Medal, Army Commendation Medal (4 OLC), Joint Service Achievement Medal, Army Achievement Medal (3 OLC), Senior Aviator Badge, Senior Parachutist Badge, Air Assault Badge, Combat Action Badge, Expert Infantryman's Badge, and the Orders of St George and St Michael.

AWARD DESCRIPTIONS

Bay State Battalion Community Service Award

This award recognizes a cadet who made an impact on their college campus or in their local community by living the Army Values and demonstrating commitment to the legacy of the Bay State Battalion and the United States Army.

Noncommissioned Officer Award

This award is given to an Aerospace Studies Cadet who displays diligence, hard work, timeliness, and character in the eyes of the detachment non-commissioned officers.

Sergeant York Award

This award recognizes the Cadet who has made a significant contribution to the battalion through unselfish giving of their time and effort.

American Veterans Award

This award recognizes a first year Cadet who demonstrates a positive attitude toward ROTC and the Air Force or Army, a neat personal appearance, outstanding personal attributes and officer potential. To be eligible, a Cadet must have received an "A" in ROTC in the most recent grading period and be in good academic standing at school.

Military Order of World Wars Award

This medal recognizes a freshman, sophomore, and junior Cadet who demonstrate an outstanding desire to serve ROTC and the United States. They must also be considered most improved in the categories of military and scholastic excellence.

Military Order of World Wars Senior Award

This medal recognizes a graduating senior who is a Guard or Reserve member or will join a local Massachusetts unit upon graduation. The senior cadet must have demonstrated outstanding leadership qualities, all around excellence in ROTC studies and activities, and demonstrates patriotism, Americanism, and love of country.

Association of the U.S. Army National ROTC Medal

This medal is awarded to a Military Science junior Cadet ranking in the top 10% in ROTC grades, top 25% in academic grades, and having contributed the most through leadership to advance the standing of Military Science at the institution.

Association of the U.S. Army Minuteman Chapter Award

This award is given to an outstanding senior Cadet who personifies the ideals of the Association of the U.S. Army

Association of U.S. Army Military History

This book is awarded to a Cadet who has completed the military history course in the current year and demonstrated strong military aptitude.

Sons of the American Revolution Award

This award recognizes an outstanding junior Cadet at each unit. To be eligible, a Cadet must demonstrate outstanding leadership qualities, military bearing, and all-around excellence in ROTC studies and activities.

National Society United States Daughters of 1812

This award recognizes an outstanding Cadet who has demonstrated qualities of academic excellence, leadership, military discipline, dependability, patriotism and upright character in speech and habits, which exemplify the ideals upon which our nation was founded.

Military Order of the Purple Heart Award

This award recognizes a ROTC student who displays exceptional leadership traits while active in school and community affairs.

Daughters of Founders and Patriots of America Award

This award recognizes an outstanding junior or senior at each unit. To be eligible, a Cadet must excel in the Aerospace Studies/Military Science class and demonstrate dependability, good character, discipline, leadership potential, patriotism, and an understanding of the importance of the American heritage.

Scottish Rite Award

This award recognizes one outstanding sophomore or junior Cadet who excels in their academic class, demonstrates patriotism, shows potential for outstanding leadership, and exhibits dependability, good character and self-discipline.

National Sojourners Award

This award recognizes an outstanding sophomore or junior Cadet at each unit who has contributed the most to encourage and demonstrate Americanism within the Cadet corps and on campus. A Cadet must rank in the top 25% of their academic class, encourage and demonstrate the ideals of Americanism, and demonstrate the potential for outstanding leadership.

General Society of the War of 1812 Award

This award recognizes an outstanding sophomore Cadet in each unit who encourages and demonstrates the ideals of Americanism. The Cadet must rank in the top 20 percent of their academic class, rank in the top 10 percent of their AS class, and encourage and demonstrate the ideals of Americanism by deed, conduct, or both.

Veterans of Foreign Wars Award

This award recognizes an outstanding Cadet who is actively engaged in the ROTC program and possesses individual characteristics contributing to leadership. To be eligible, a Cadet must be in good standing academically and militarily. They must also have outstanding achievement in community service and/or the Cadet program, outstanding leadership in the Cadet program, high moral character, exceptional professionalism in appearance and actions, outstanding military bearing, potential and willingness to assume higher levels of responsibility, and be involved in patriotic programs, such as drill team, color guard, Arnold Air Society, or recruiting.

Military Officers Association of America Award

This award recognizes an outstanding junior Cadet at each unit. To be eligible, a Cadet must be in good academic standing, be of high moral character, show a high order of loyalty to the unit, school, and country, and show exceptional potential for military leadership.

Reserve Officers Association Award

This award recognizes outstanding Cadets at each unit. A Cadet must demonstrate a positive attitude, a neat personal appearance, officer potential, and military courtesy. Additionally, they must rank in the top 10% of their Aerospace Studies/Military Science class.

AFCEA International Honor Certificate

This award recognizes a Cadet in a scientific or technical field who has demonstrated leadership and achievement in academics.

National Defense Transportation Association Award

This award recognizes one outstanding junior or senior Cadet who demonstrates excellence in leadership, academics, aptitude for military service, and noteworthy service in the promotion of safety or security of people or property.

National Defense Industrial Association Award

This award recognizes one outstanding Cadet at each unit. A Cadet must have received a B or better in all junior and senior Aerospace Studies/Military Science academics, and excel in their Aerospace Studies/Military Science class. Additionally, the Cadet must demonstrate outstanding leadership qualities

American Legion Military Excellence Award

This award recognizes Cadets at each unit for general military excellence. To be eligible, a Cadet must rank in the top 25% of the respective Aerospace Studies/Military Science class and demonstrate outstanding qualities in military leadership, discipline, character and citizenship.

American Legion Scholastic Excellence Award

This award recognizes a freshman, sophomore, junior, and senior Cadet at each unit for scholastic achievement. To be eligible, a Cadet must rank in the upper 10% of their graduating class and in the upper 25% of their Aerospace Studies/Military Science class, must demonstrate outstanding military leadership qualities, and must actively participate in constructive student activities such as student organizations or sports.

Daughters of the American Revolution Award

This award recognizes one outstanding senior Cadet at each unit. To be eligible, a Cadet must rank in the top 25% of both the Aerospace Studies/Military Science class and the institution's graduating class. They must also demonstrate dependability, good character, discipline, leadership ability, and a fundamental and patriotic understanding of the importance of ROTC.

Lexington-Concord Chapter Armed Forces Communications and Electronics Association Scholarship Award

This scholarship recognizes a junior or senior Cadet who is majoring in a scientific or technical field and demonstrates outstanding officer potential.

USAA Spirit Award

This award recognizes the Cadet who best embodies the concept of service to the unit, community, and nation.

Worcester Veterans Council Award

This award recognizes an outstanding Cadet based on leadership, performance, aptitude, military bearing, and appearance.

Kenneth J. Kubilins Memorial Award

This memorial award recognizes an outstanding Aerospace Studies freshman Cadet *as voted by their peers*, based on the following criteria: leadership, wing performance, attitude, military bearing and appearance. The award is named in memory of 2d Lt Kenneth J. "Kahn" Kubilins, a 1983 Worcester Polytechnic Institute and Air Force ROTC Detachment 340 graduate killed during training when his T-38 crashed at Vance Air Force Base in October 1984.

Bay State Ranger Leadership Excellence Award

Awarded annually to the MS4 Cadet who served as the Ranger Challenge Captain; embodied the Ranger Creed, and demonstrated that Competence Breeds Confidence and Confidence Breeds Excellence.

General Curtis LeMay Award

This award recognizes an outstanding Aerospace Studies sophomore Cadet *as voted by their peers*, based on the following criteria: leadership, wing performance, attitude, military bearing and appearance.

Armed Forces Committee of Worcester County Award For AFROTC and AROTC

The Air Force award recognizes an outstanding Aerospace Studies junior Cadet based on the following criteria: leadership, wing performance, attitude, military bearing and appearance. The Army award recognizes an outstanding Army Cadet based on the following criteria: leadership, performance, attitude, military bearing and appearance.

Air Force Association Outstanding Cadet of the Year

This award recognizes the most outstanding junior Cadet at each Air Force ROTC unit for outstanding achievement in leadership and academic standing in the Air Force ROTC program.

Air Force Association Paul Revere Award

This award recognizes outstanding cadets at each detachment who demonstrate characteristics contributing to leadership and future potential as an officer. Nominees must have a positive attitude toward AFROTC, show initiative and self-confidence, be of high moral character, and reflect a positive image of the United States Air Force.

Society of American Military Engineers Award

The Society of American Military Engineers award recognizes outstanding junior and senior engineering students in Army ROTC. The purpose of this award is to impress upon undergraduate engineering students, by appropriate recognition of meritorious promise of achievement in the field, the importance of engineering to national security. To be eligible, a Cadet must rank in the upper 25% of their engineering class and in the top 25% of their ROTC classes.

Steven J. Duso Memorial Award

This memorial award recognizes an outstanding senior Aerospace Studies Cadet *as voted by their peers*, based on the following criteria: leadership, wing performance, attitude, military bearing, and appearance. The award is named in memory of Steven J. Duso, an Air Force ROTC Detachment 340 Cadet who died while soloing from Sterling Airport on 22 November 1980.

Ancient and Honorable Artillery Company of Massachusetts Award

This award is given to two Military Science senior Cadets who demonstrate outstanding motivation and military aptitude, preferably with National Guard service or aspiration to it.

Archibald R. Lemieux Award

This award recognizes an outstanding Aerospace Studies junior Cadet *as voted by their peers*, based on the following criteria: leadership, wing performance, attitude, military bearing and appearance.

Department of the Army Superior Cadet Award

This award is given annually to the outstanding ROTC Cadet in each year of Military Science at the institution. The Cadet must be in the top 25% of ROTC and academic standing. Selection criteria consist of ROTC Scholarship and GPA, Academic Scholarship and GPA, Military Leadership and Academic Leadership.

Laura Matejik Memorial Award

CPT Laura Metajik Eberts was an alumnus of the WPI Army ROTC Bay State Battalion commissioning class of 2004. She was a varsity athlete in field hockey and rugby at WPI, an avid long distance runner, and graduated with a 4.0 in Biomedical Engineering. After receiving her Juris Doctorate from George Washington University, she served as JAG Corps officer at Redstone Arsenal, AL and deployed in support of Operation Enduring Freedom in 2010. She is remembered by all as a dedicated wife, Soldier, classmate, and friend. The individual receiving this award is an embodiment of the spirit of Laura and all that she stood for.

Professor of Military Science Award

This award recognizes the outstanding leadership of the Cadet Battalion Commanders.

Brigadier General John E. Murray Award

The Brigadier General John E. Murray Award recognizes excellence in the freshman class and is nominated based on academic GPA, athletic performance, and on-campus ROTC training.

Air Force Distinguished Graduate Award

The Distinguished Graduate is nominated based on academic GPA, athletic performance, on-campus ROTC training and performance at the Field Training. Only the most outstanding Cadets in the top 10% of the nation earn the distinction of Distinguished Graduate. The Air Force ROTC Detachment 340 Distinguished Graduate is awarded the DG Saber and has their name engraved in the Commander's Trophy.

Department of the Army Senior Military Merit Award

The Army Senior Merit Award is presented to cadets who rank in the top 20% of their national cohort.

General George C. Marshall Award

This award is given to the most outstanding Military Science senior Cadet having completed the ROTC Advanced Camp who demonstrated those leadership and scholastic qualities that epitomized the career of General Marshall.

The Army Values—Superior Leadership Award

This award recognizes the one Cadet in the battalion that best exemplifies the Army Values. We use the letters LDRSHIP to remember each one. Many people know what the words Loyalty, Duty, Respect, Selfless Service, Honor, Integrity and Personal Courage mean; however, these values are not always lived up to. This award recognizes the one Cadet who epitomizes these words every day of their life.
